







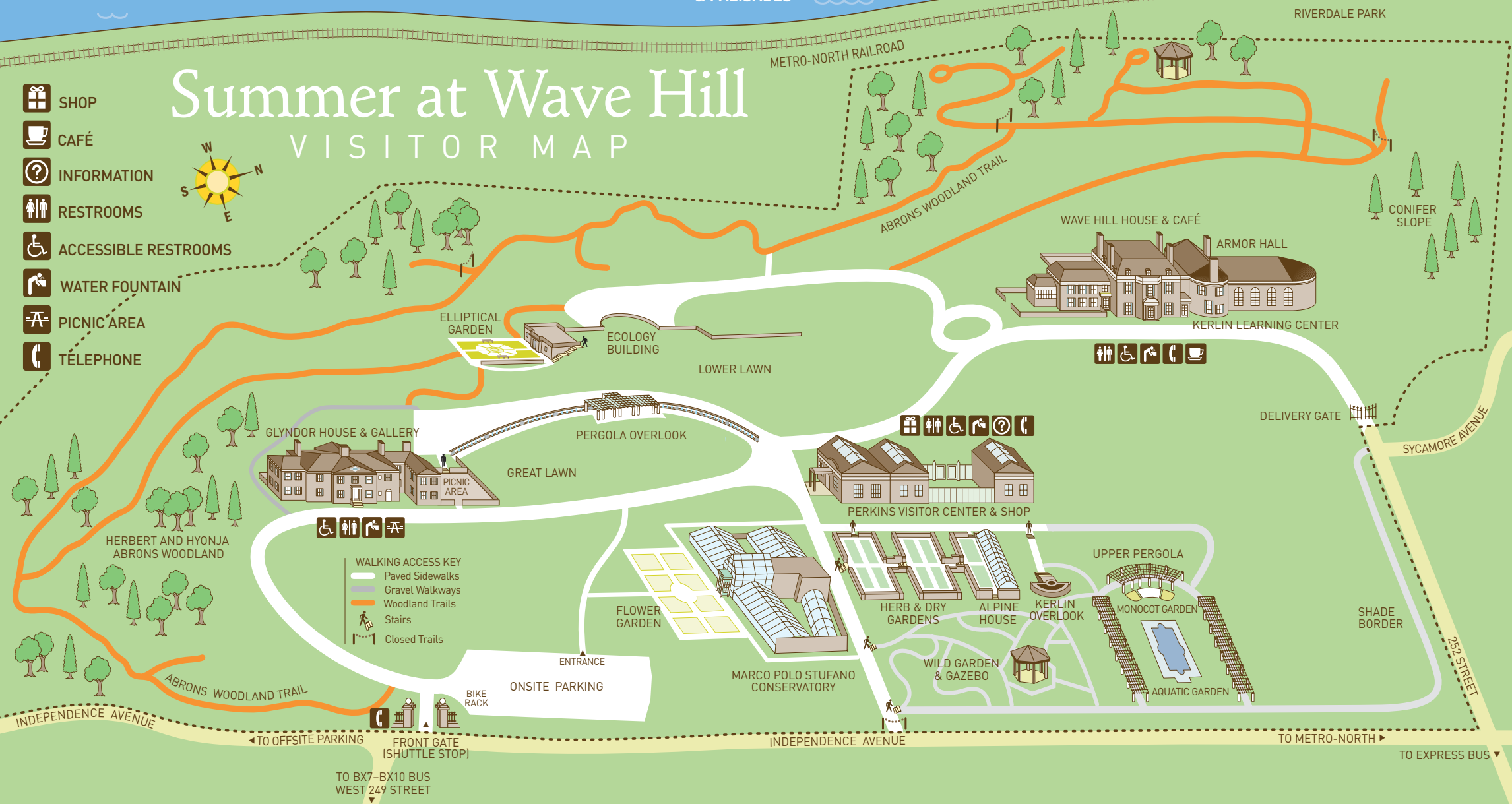


Summer at Wave Hill

Within its 28 intimate acres, Wave Hill offers a broad range of species in diverse environments, from hardy outdoor plants to tender specimens in the main greenhouses. The scale of the space helps maintain the qualities of a private estate, while the artistry of the design in the garden spaces encourages visitors to explore every corner of the grounds throughout the seasons.

HIGHLIGHTS IN THE GARDENS THIS SEASON

THE FLOWER GARDEN Surrounded by a rustic cedar fence and secluded benches, this exuberant garden combines formality and informality, its geometric beds planted with inspired combinations of perennials, annuals, bulbs, shrubs and tender plants. Find ideas for your own garden or window box.

THE WILD GARDEN Selected wild species from around the world are combined to achieve the Wild Garden's "planted-by-nature" effect. The Wild Garden is inspired by the informally planted English wild garden as championed by the Irish writer William Robinson, an influential 19th-century garden designer.

HERB AND DRY GARDENS The stone foundations of a former greenhouse create a cloister-like setting for these two, connected gardens. Ornamental, culinary and medicinal herbs from around the world make their home in the Herb Garden. In the Dry Garden, showy plants from warmer and drier regions of the world relish the heat of the summer, blooming from mid-summer through fall.
